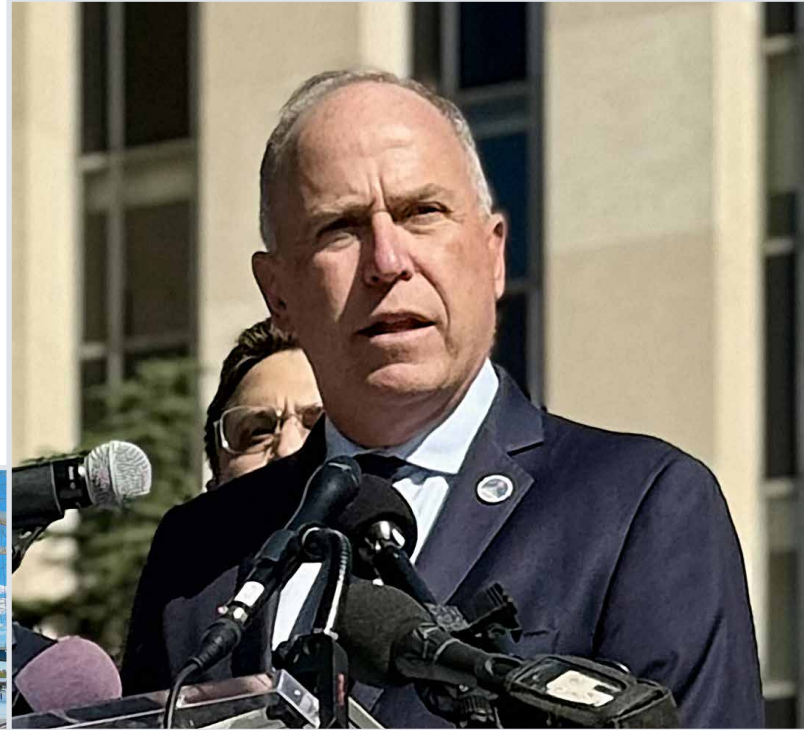

OAG IN 2024: Protecting DC Residents

OAG secured over \$661 million in savings and benefits for DC

\$303.9 million in civil litigation liability avoided

Fighting for DC Residents



STANDING UP TO SLUMLORDS

Sued notorious slumlord Sam Razjooyan for egregious housing code violations, disregarding stop-work orders, and defrauding a District housing voucher program.

PRESERVING AFFORDABLE HOUSING

Won a settlement that will preserve 76 critical affordable housing units at Foster House in Shaw and provide \$650,000 in restitution to tenants who endured years of neglect.

HOLDING TAX CHEATS ACCOUNTABLE

Secured \$40 million from billionaire Michael J. Saylor in the largest income tax fraud recovery in DC history.

DEFENDING DISTRICT WORKERS

Secured \$3.75 million from construction firm Power Design for misclassifying and denying sick leave to its workers in DC's largest-ever workers' rights enforcement action.

TAKING ACTION AGAINST POLLUTERS

Sued Fort Myer Construction for repeatedly contaminating the Anacostia River in violation of the Water Pollution Control Act.

CRACKING DOWN ON DECEPTIVE BUSINESS PRACTICES

Sued StubHub for charging District customers deceptive prices and junk fees using a predatory drip pricing model.

TAKING A STAND FOR EQUITY

Sued Amazon for deceiving 48,000 residents in Ward 7 and Ward 8 into paying the full price for Prime membership while secretly excluding them Prime delivery benefits.

ENSURING FAIRNESS FOR HOMEOWNERS

Dismantled a sweeping title insurance scheme where title companies offered illegal payouts to realtors in exchange for client referrals — and secured \$3.7 million in restitution for harmed homeowners.

PROTECTING OUR KIDS

Sued TikTok for preying on children with an intentionally addictive and psychologically damaging platform.

LOOKING OUT FOR DC SENIORS

Secured \$7.5 million in restitution and penalties from Curbio for a home renovation scheme that trapped homeowners — including many senior citizens — in financially devastating contracts.

Public Safety

THE OFFICE OF THE ATTORNEY GENERAL uses every legal tool available to improve public safety for all DC residents. As the District’s prosecutor of crimes committed by juveniles, OAG ensures that young people face consequences when they break the law, supports victims of crime, and works with DC agencies responsible for preventing youth from reoffending.

OAG’s Role in the Adult DC Criminal Justice System

Because the District is not a state, OAG’s prosecutorial authority is limited to crimes committed by juveniles and certain adult misdemeanors. Adult felonies and most misdemeanors are prosecuted by the U.S. Attorney for the District of Columbia, who is appointed by the President and confirmed by the Senate. **Lack of statehood means that DC has little control over many aspects of the local criminal justice system, and any statutory reforms require approval from Congress.**

Prosecuting Juvenile Gun Crimes

OAG prosecutes all serious violent juvenile offenses when it has the evidence to do so — holding kids accountable when they cause harm, while also working with District agencies to help ensure that kids receive appropriate interventions so they do not reoffend. **Last year, OAG prosecuted 84.3% of all juvenile violent crime cases — including homicides, robberies, assaults, and carjackings.**

Working to Reduce Youth Recidivism

Ensuring that justice-involved youth do not commit more crimes is critical to improving public safety in DC. In the most serious criminal cases, young people who are successfully prosecuted by our office are committed to the Department of Youth Rehabilitation Services (DYRS). DYRS is then responsible for effectively rehabilitating youth in its custody to reduce the likelihood that they will reoffend. In May 2024, OAG introduced the ROAD Act to hold DYRS accountable for better outcomes in the juvenile justice system. **The DC Council unanimously passed the ROAD Act in December 2024.**

Combatting Illegal Gun Trafficking

Attorney General Schwalb teamed up with Maryland Attorney General Anthony Brown to sue three Maryland gun stores for facilitating the trafficking of illegal guns that fuel violence in our region. According to the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives, **approximately 95% of illegal firearms recovered in DC were originally purchased in other states and then trafficked into our communities.**

Supporting Victims of Crime

In addition to prosecuting juvenile crime, **OAG’s Victim Witness Specialists work with victims, witnesses of violent crimes, and those injured in traffic offenses to help them regain a sense of normalcy in their lives.** Our Victim Witness Specialists provide victims with referrals to critical resources including mental health counseling, housing, medical support, and legal assistance. They also help provide victims with compensation through the Crime Victims Compensation program.

This year, OAG prosecuted 72.6% of all juvenile crimes — including both violent and non-violent offenses.

In 2024, OAG had the highest juvenile prosecution rates since before 2019 for both violent offenses and all offenses.

Holding Reckless Drivers Accountable

OAG works to make the District's streets safer for all road users by holding the most dangerous drivers accountable. That includes prosecuting drivers who commit serious traffic offenses, including impaired driving, reckless driving, hit-and-runs, and operating a vehicle on a suspended license. **In 2024, our office prosecuted 97% of DUIs and 96% of reckless and aggravated reckless driving cases.**

Defending our Gun Safety Laws

OAG defends the District's gun safety laws against court challenges and stands up for common-sense gun restrictions nationwide. These laws stem the flow of lethal weapons into our communities and the horrific violence they fuel. In 2024, **our office intervened in 15 court cases in support of federal gun safety laws** — including restrictions on untraceable ghost guns and prohibitions on carrying guns in sensitive places like churches and school grounds.

Funding Community-Rooted Crime Reduction Initiatives

OAG funds and oversees **Cure the Streets**, a community-rooted violence reduction program that employs a targeted public-health approach to prevent shootings in neighborhoods that are struggling with gun violence. **In 2024, our Cure the Streets teams helped drive an 18% decrease in shootings and a 26% decrease in gun homicides across their focus areas.** In 2023, despite gun violence surging across DC, the rates of violent gun crimes in Cure the Streets' ten target communities decreased.

In March, Attorney General Schwalb **announced \$1 million in new, continuing grants for 11 "Leaders of Tomorrow" youth violence prevention awardees**, which are high-impact local community organizations serving DC youth and families. Alongside effective policing and prosecution, violence prevention programs like these are an essential part of a successful comprehensive public safety strategy.

Shutting Down Illegal Cannabis Shops

OAG worked closely with MPD and the Alcoholic Beverage and Cannabis Administration (ABCA) **to shut down 11 cannabis shops that were operating illegally in the District** and selling products that posed a direct threat to DC residents. Many of the shuttered cannabis shops sold cannabis products that tested positive for additional substances, including methamphetamine.

Working with Businesses to Improve Security

After a series of violent crimes at the Ivy City Hotel in Ward 5, **OAG worked to secure an agreement with the property owners to improve safety in and around the building** by increasing overnight security staffing, upgrading exterior security cameras and lighting, and linking cameras to MPD's Real Time Crime Center. Under the District's Nuisance Act, OAG has authority to take legal action against property owners if there is a pattern of illegal drug, firearm, or prostitution activity on their properties and they fail to take appropriate security measures.

By working with MPD and other DC agencies to implement a comprehensive public safety strategy, OAG contributed to a **35% decrease in violent crime and a 15% decrease in crime overall in 2024** — making it the year with the lowest yearly crime rates in over three decades.

Supporting Youth and Families

Right Direction Awards for DC Youth

In September, OAG honored 29 “Champions Rising to the Challenge” at its 2024 Right Direction Awards, which **celebrate the resiliency, leadership, and achievements of young people in the District**, as well as exceptional adults who support and empower our youth.

Uplifting the Voices of Young People

OAG organizes the DC chapter of Do the Write Thing (DtWT), a national anti-violence essay competition that gives middle school students **the chance to speak out about how violence affects their lives and express their ideas about what must be done to end it**. Each year, OAG selects two students with exceptional essays to serve as the District’s National Ambassadors for DtWT — giving them the opportunity to represent DC at the national level.

Positive Messaging on Social Media

OAG launched #FutureMeDC, an innovative credible messenger campaign to reach youth across DC with positive messaging on social media that encourages safe and healthy choices. Videos produced by local creators for the campaign have received **over 2,600,000 views** and **over 164,000 engagements**. The campaign was a partnership with the American Psychiatric Association Foundation.

Keeping Kids in School

OAG’s **ATTEND** (Abating Truancy Through Engagement and Negotiated Dialogue) Mediation Program operates in eight District schools, working to combat truancy and keep kids in school by addressing the underlying causes of chronic absenteeism. ATTEND mediates cases between parents and the school in a neutral environment and links the parents to appropriate community-based services that help them overcome barriers to regular school attendance. **In 2024, kids of families who participated in ATTEND had 24.5% fewer unexcused absences.**

Protecting District Children from Harmful Social Media Platforms

OAG sued TikTok for misleading users and their parents about the safety of its platform, which is intentionally designed to be addictive to kids and has caused significant psychological and physical harm to children in DC and across the country. The lawsuit also accuses TikTok of operating a predatory, illegal virtual economy that allows for the financial and sexual exploitation of children.

Strengthening DC Families

Successfully placed 132 District children from the foster care system with families. OAG attorneys collaborate with social workers to find safe, loving, and permanent homes for District children through family reunification, adoption, permanent legal guardianship, or custody arrangements. In 2024, our Family Services Division reunited 67 children with their families, successfully placed 52 children in families through adoption, and found permanent homes for 13 children through legal guardianship or legal custody.

Provided 200 legal consultations to keep families together. A new team within OAG's Family Services Division enhances legal support for Child and Family Services Agency (CFSA) social workers. The team helps CFSA keep families intact and overcome challenges by connecting them to much-needed resources.

Collected \$45.4 million in child support payments. OAG's Child Support Services team helps District residents collect ongoing child support payments that sustain children and families. The team works to locate absent parents, establish paternity, and enforce delinquent support orders. In 2024, our Child Support Services Division handled more than 40,700 cases servicing over 58,500 children.

Connected 892 non-custodial parents with work opportunities and services. OAG's Alternative Solutions Center (ASC) empowers non-custodial parents to better support their children and works to connect them with long-term employment and critical supports and services.

Empowering DC's Next Generation

OAG's High School Advisory Council (HSAC) is an intensive six-week, paid program that brings District students together to make important policy recommendations to the Attorney General and his staff. It is an opportunity for high school students to engage their government in a meaningful way and give young people a seat at the table in making decisions about critical issues that directly affect them.

Fighting for Tenants and Affordable Housing

Dismantling a Title Insurance Scheme

OAG uncovered and dismantled a sweeping and illegal title insurance kickback scheme that targeted DC homebuyers. Allied, Universal, KVS, Union, and Modern offered illegal payouts to realtors in exchange for steering clients to them. Our settlement required the companies to pay over \$2 million in restitution to impacted homeowners and cease all illegal payouts. Buying a home in DC is hard enough as it is. DC residents should be able to make fully informed decisions about how to spend their hard-earned money without worrying about being cheated.

Preserving Affordable Housing in Shaw

OAG secured a major settlement to preserve badly-needed affordable housing units in Shaw and provide restitution to tenants who endured years of neglect. Foster House is a Ward 2 apartment building where tenants — many of whom are low-income senior citizens — have been subjected to severe housing code violations since at least 2018. The settlement will deliver \$650,000 to the tenants, forgive all owed rent, and guarantee them the right to return when the building is redeveloped. The settlement also preserves 76 affordable housing units for decades to come. OAG will not allow landlords to neglect their properties and force out longtime DC residents.

Enforcing Affordable Housing Laws

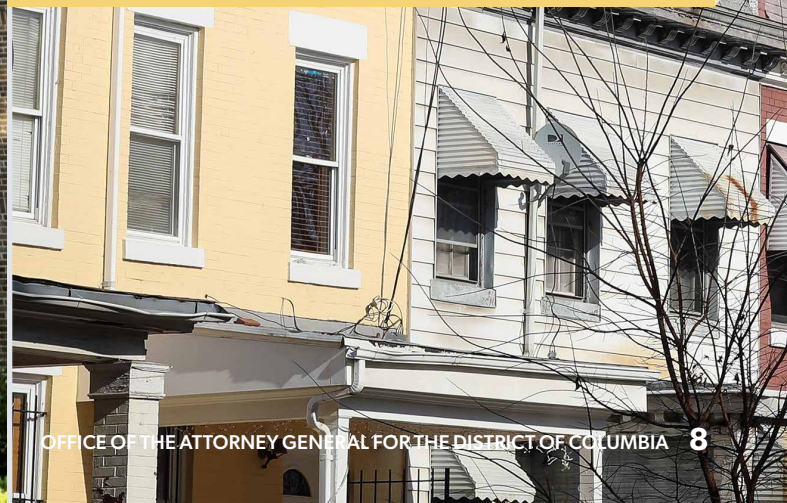
OAG took legal action against several landlords who violated their obligation to provide affordable housing units to District residents. In one case, a landlord subject to inclusionary zoning requirements charged a DC family more than double the permissible rent. In another case, a landlord chose to rent out a designated affordable unit on AirBnB at a premium instead of making it available to an income-qualifying DC resident. Affordable housing requirements in DC help ensure that all District residents can find a home in our city — regardless of their income. OAG will not let landlords blatantly violate the law.

Securing Relief for Mayfair Mansions

OAG secured over \$1 million to improve housing conditions at Mayfair Mansions — a 410-unit Ward 7 apartment complex. After receiving resident complaints, OAG launched an investigation and secured a settlement with Mayfair that includes payments to impacted tenants, historic investments to improve conditions, and measures to ensure the properties remain safe and habitable in the future. The tenants of Mayfair Mansions, like all District residents, deserve a safe and secure place to call home.

Suing a Notorious Slumlord

OAG sued notorious DC slumlord Sam Razjooyan and his associates for horrific housing code violations, illegal construction, and defrauding DC's Rapid Rehousing program. For too long, tenants at 1644–1656 W Street SE and Minnesota Commons have been forced to live with pest infestations, mounting trash piles, broken doors and windows, and worse. At the same properties, Razjooyan has also been subjecting tenants to dangerous, illegal construction while falsely certifying that his buildings are up to code so he can fraudulently collect tens of thousands of dollars from a DC voucher program for residents experiencing homelessness. OAG won a court order requiring the landlord to address the serious issues at these two properties in Ward 7 and Ward 8.

Safeguarding Our Environment

Holding Polluters Accountable and Pursuing Environmental Justice

- Sued Fort Myer Construction for **polluting DC rivers and streams** by repeatedly discharging contaminated runoff into DC's stormwater system.
- Worked with former Ward 7 Councilmember Vincent Gray and the Council to pass the **Illegal Dumping Enforcement Act**, a law that empowers OAG to take civil action against entities that pollute DC.
- Required Kenmore Pest Control to cover the District's clean-up costs and pay civil penalties for **illegally using restricted pesticides** near DC apartment buildings and endangering local communities.
- Won a judgment against Rodgers Brothers Custodial Services, a Ward 5 trash transfer facility that **illegally discharged construction and demolition debris into District waterways**, including the Anacostia River.
- Secured over \$2.1 million from AltaGas for **failing to develop the solar energy capacity that it promised** as a condition of its 2018 merger with Washington Gas.

Standing Up for DC Workers

Protecting DC Workers Against Wage Theft and Misclassification

- Obtained \$3.75 million from Power Design for more than 1,200 harmed construction workers and the District in **DC's largest-ever workers' rights enforcement action**.
- Secured \$2 million for more than 250 misclassified employees from Arise, a gig economy customer service company that **denied workers minimum wage pay, overtime, and sick leave**.
- Recouped more than \$525,000 from Swahili Village, a restaurant in Ward 2, for **systematically stealing workers' wages and tips** and violating other DC labor laws.
- Sued five construction companies and labor brokers for a **sweeping illegal worker misclassification scheme** that cheated more than 370 construction workers, including workers who labored on the high-end City Ridge development in Ward 3.
- Reached a settlement with Tricon Construction and four of its subcontractors to pay \$350,000 to approximately **200 workers** and the District for an illegal worker misclassification scheme.
- Required Clean Team Janitorial Services to **pay \$220,000 in unpaid wages and damages to 33 workers** it underpaid and withheld benefits from for three years.
- Secured more than \$186,000 for IHG Management hotel restaurant workers and the District after IHG Management **misled staff about compensation practices**.

Defending Consumers and Combatting Deception and Fraud

Confronting Corporate Abuses

- Secured a major victory from the DC Court of Appeals reviving our antitrust lawsuit against **Amazon** to end its illegal control of online retail pricing that hikes costs for consumers, kills innovation, and hurts small businesses.
- Sued **StubHub** for predatory pricing that deceives customers by adding junk fees at the end of a lengthy transaction process to illegally boost profits.
- Required the manufacturer of **Zyn** nicotine pouches to pay \$1.2 million and strengthen its compliance practices after we investigated potential violations of DC's flavored tobacco ban.
- Joined a federal lawsuit to successfully block the **\$25 billion merger between Albertsons and Kroger** that would have hiked grocery store prices and reduced competition, including in DC where we have Kroger-owned Harris Teeter and Albertsons-owned Safeway stores.
- Successfully sued **Empower, an unregistered ridesharing service**, for refusing to follow DC law and take basic steps to ensure rider safety — including showing proof of insurance coverage and background checks for drivers.

Consumer Mediation Program

A FREE service that facilitates resolution of issues between DC residents and landlords or businesses without going to court.

- ▶ **Responded to over 8,500 consumer complaints** through OAG's Consumer Mediation Program.
- ▶ **Recovered more than \$1.2 million** through one-on-one mediations for District residents.

Protecting DC Residents from Being Cheated

- Recovered \$7.5 million from a home renovation company called **Curbio** that trapped DC homeowners — including many seniors — in financially devastating contracts and put an end to their predatory practices.
- Sued app-based lender **EarnIn** for deceiving more than 20,000 DC borrowers with deceptive marketing and charging illegally high interest rates for instant loans.
- Sued **Amazon** for secretly excluding more than 48,000 Ward 7 and Ward 8 residents from Prime delivery benefits while charging them for full Prime memberships.
- Shut down a **recruitment firm** that exploited more than 60 foreign exchange program school teachers in DC and secured restitution for educators who were harmed.

Ensuring Nonprofits Serve the Common Good

- Forced the **National Rifle Association Foundation** to overhaul its oversight and transparency safeguards after it misused nonprofit funds and violated DC's Nonprofit Corporation Act.
- Sued police reform nonprofit **Raheem AI** and its director for misappropriating \$75,000 for personal expenses while refusing to pay a DC-based employee the wages she earned.
- Sued the former treasurer of **Powell Elementary's parent-teacher organization** for stealing the school's nonprofit funds and using them for personal enrichment.



Standing Up for DC Values



Protecting our Fundamental Rights

OAG continues to lead in the fight to defend our core democratic values in DC and across the country.

- Led a coalition of 24 attorneys general that **defended the ATF’s federal ghost gun rule** aimed at stopping untraceable, easy-to-assemble firearms from flooding into our communities.
- Assembled a coalition of 19 attorneys general to **defend Section 2 of the Voting Rights Act** as a key protection against racial discrimination in elections in a Georgia redistricting lawsuit.
- Spearheaded a coalition of 11 attorneys general urging the Supreme Court to **uphold principles of due process in death penalty cases**.
- Collaborated with seven attorneys general to **challenge an Ohio law that would disenfranchise voters with disabilities** by making it a felony to return another person’s ballot.
- Led or joined over 51 appellate briefs to **advance reproductive justice, LGBTQ+ rights, gun safety laws, voting rights, and environmental protections**.

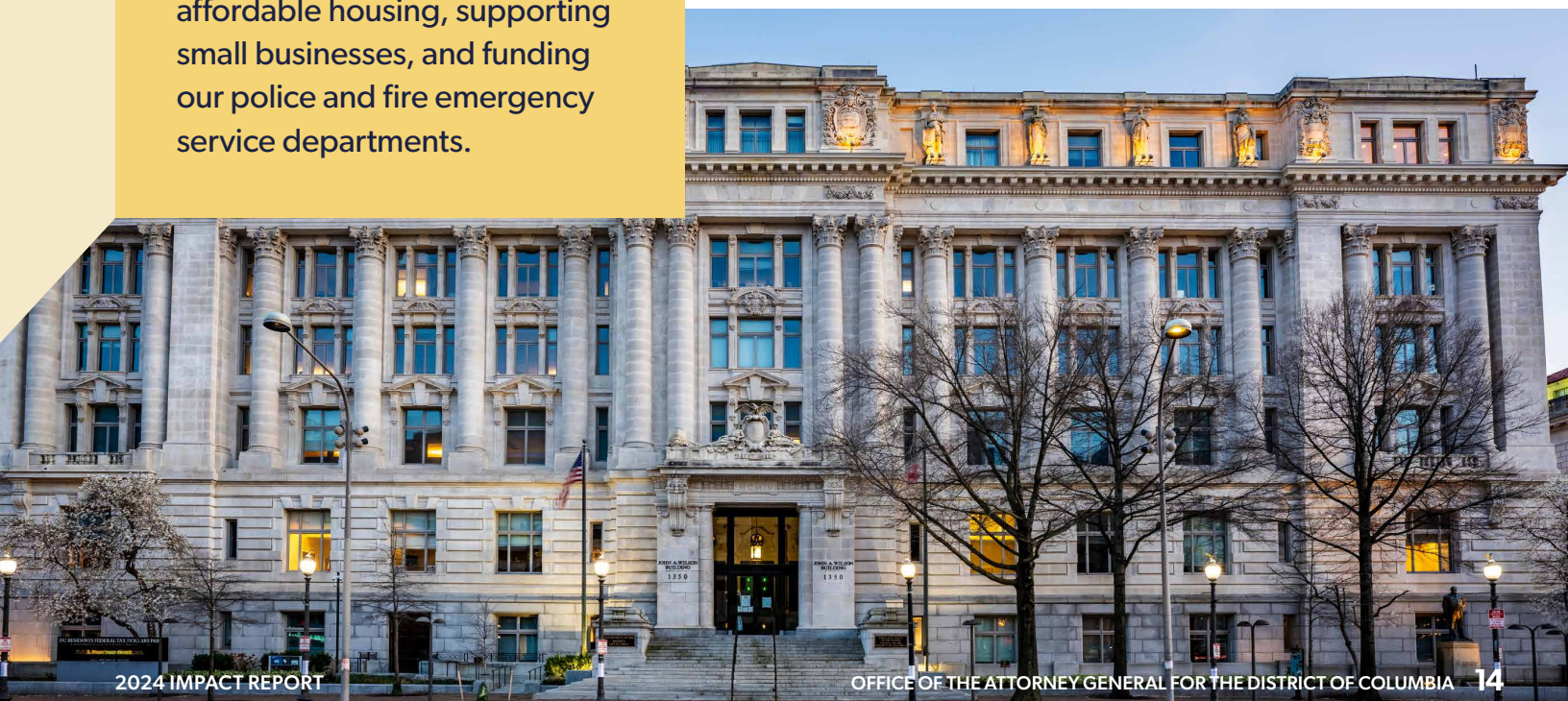
Defending the District and Our Laws

As the District's Chief Legal Officer, **OAG defends the District from lawsuits and defends our laws when they are challenged in court.** We also provide legal advice and representation to District leaders, lawmakers, and agencies. Our attorneys conduct trainings on rulemaking, legal sufficiency, appropriations, and guidance for ANC Commissioners. And we proactively advise DC agencies to help them operate effectively, reduce their liability, and save the District money.



Every dollar we save by diligently defending the District in court and upholding our laws is another dollar that can go towards improving our schools, maintaining our parks, operating our libraries, building affordable housing, supporting small businesses, and funding our police and fire emergency service departments.
